
# Welcome to Our New Pope

As you are no doubt aware, yesterday, a new Pope was chosen as the leader of the Catholic Church. He was previously known as Cardinal Robert Prevost and has taken the name Pope Leo XIV. The last pope with this name was Pope Leo XIII, over one hundred years ago, whose work was the basis for Catholic Social Teaching.

Pope Leo XIV is the first Pope ever to come from the United States of America. He is 69 years old and originally from Chicago. He has also spent many years in Peru, helping people there.

In his first message to the world, Pope Leo XIV spoke about peace. He said he wants the Church to "build bridges" and "welcome everyone."

# Nursery

We have been learning: about caterpillars and the cycle of a butterfly. We have our caterpillars in the Nursery and we will watch them transform into beautiful butterflies. You can help at home by: talking to your child about the cycle of a butterfly.

Reception

We have been learning: about different types of vegetables. We enjoyed trying the different varieties.

You can help at home by: encouraging your child to eat different foods.

Year 1

We have been learning: to write a fact file about animals in Antarctica. You can help at home by: researching a new animal and creating a fact file.

Year 2

We have been learning: to find  $\frac{1}{2}$ ,  $\frac{1}{3}$  and  $\frac{1}{4}$  of numbers up to 30.

You can help at home by: giving your child questions and seeing if they can draw a sharing shape to find the answer.

Year 3

We have been learning: about conversions in maths for mass and capacity. You can help at home by: asking your child 'How many millilitres in a litre? How many grams in a kilogram?'

Year 4

We have been learning: about effective searching in computing. You can help at home by: asking your child to define 'search engine' and how to research online safely.

Year 5

We have been learning: about percentages. You can help at home by: asking your child how to show percentages as decimals.

Year 6

We have been learning: about changing the brightness of a bulb and explaining the reasoning behind this.

You can help at home by: asking your child how voltage is shared in series circuits.
