National Clean Air Day

National Clean Air Day is a dedicated occasion to raise awareness about the impact of air pollution on both our health and the environment.

Air pollution is linked to between 29,000 and 43,000 deaths each year in the UK. Both the World Health Organization and the UK Government recognise air pollution as the greatest environmental threat to our health.

Children are especially vulnerable, as their lungs, immune systems, and brains are still developing. Exposure to polluted air can affect their physical health, impair their ability to learn, and in severe cases, even result in death.

As yesterday was National Clean Air Day, we are encouraging everyone to take action next week. Please try to walk or cycle to school. If you need to drive, consider parking further away and walking the last 5 to 10 minutes.
